In the list of programs that "have been prioritized for preservation" includes (of interest to Alliance):

K-12 State School Fund remains at \$9 billion, sparing students and teachers from devastating program cuts amid the uncertainty of the pandemic and holding critical investments in public education harmless at a time of great uncertainty.

- Student Success Act funding for early learning programs, High School Success (Ballot Measure 98) and programs in the Statewide Education Initiatives account.
- The Community College Support Fund and the Public University Support Fund.
- State support for the OHSU Schools of Medicine, Nursing, and Dentistry, as well as funding for the OHSU Child Development and Rehabilitation Center and the Oregon Poison Center.
- Housing stabilization programs, including the Emergency Housing Assistance, State Homeless Assistance programs, and funding for affordable housing preservation, multifamily housing development, and foreclosure prevention counseling services.
- Child welfare investments and other programs providing benefits to those most in need
- Funds to support the current prison population and maintenance of funding for community corrections.
- Community residential treatment capacity for youth.



• Department of Veterans' Affairs positions to provide advocacy and other services, as well as Veterans' Emergency Financial Assistance, the Veterans Crisis Line and other grant programs.

Workforce – common thread with Alliance and AOCMHP on workforce recruitment, retention, and training

When looking through policy agendas, keeping in mind cost to speak in terms others may understand

Legislators are there for the short-term whereas community members are long-term. These policies may resonate with community members so doing outreach to them and continuing to encourage them to meet with legislators

FEMA – restrictive on what dollars can be used for. Half of Oregon counties applied for FEMA dollars.

SB 1 In home services dollars – advocacy being done to preserve this; asking people to see long-term picture. IHS is more than a program, it's a whole service level.

Budget exercise = what agencies could cut if they have to but don't want to; CATS was on the first list

## Meghan IVPP Information:

For your awareness, PHD Injury and Violence Prevention Program has some other grants related to this topic area that we have recently applied for or been granted.

- Awarded: CDC Core State Injury and Violence Prevention (SVIPP) COVID-19 Supplemental Funds: Additional funds will be focused on ACEs/suicide prevention. Time period: June 1, 2020 – July 31, 2021. Amount \$173,913.00 (total). We are working with HSD on aspects of this funding (supporting LGBTQ+ minigrants).
- Awarded: SAMHSA Zero Suicide in Health Systems grant: Not COVID specific funding. Focused on implementing suicide safer care through quality improvement with Oregon healthcare systems focused on adults age 25+. Time period: 8/31/20 8/30/25. Amount: \$700,000/year.
- Submitted Application: CDC Firearm Injury Surveillance Through Emergency Rooms (FASTER). The work proposed under this grant opportunity will enhance local surveillance of nonfatal firearm injuries by increasing the timeliness of aggregate reporting on outcomes and disseminating findings to key stakeholders working to prevent firearm injuries, to inform



			and enhance statewide injury prevention efforts. Time period:
