	Have overview of the state and what trainings
	are happening where. Heat map where you
	can toggle over certain areas to see what
	programs are active. This alongside suicide
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data for the area to compare number of suicide deaths and number of trainings available. From that, you can see how effective these trainings are.

Would the coalitions be interested in sponsoring something like this for their regions? Close coalitions could partner together.

If we have information in a database, we can automate surveys to be sent out at specific times.

Logistical challenges – different organizations have their own registration systems. So asking them to maintain two different systems adds levels and steps that may decrease participation. Need to figure out workflow. If any programs have fees or CEUs, this impacts what system is used.

Sampling – do we send a survey to each person OR do we send it out to specific people that meet criteria?

There is a crucial decision to make – go for the low hanging fruit of working directly with trainers and not connect with trainees. OR



			work with both avenues that adds layers of things to figure out. Really need to think about what information we want and think will make the biggest difference. One option, invite Big 7 coordinators to this meeting and show what they currently have gathered.
10:10	Discuss some YSIPP 2.0 Recommendations: Lived Experience Advisory	-Review Lived Experience recommendations marked as "High" to begin to develop measurable language	Recommendations that were discussed: SLOP (mentioned above) could be funded as a pilot in Clackamas County and then expand the pilot to different parts of the state, one in rural Oregon and one in Coastal Oregon. There are no supports for attempt survivors outside of therapy but not everyone can access therapy. Support groups like this could be extremely helpful and are asked for by many attempt survivors. Alliance Lived Experience Advisory could serve as the middle man for this effort. Measurable Outcome: Having a database for people to search for local support groups. Would AFSP be the best housing area for this website? How can we track if the database / website is getting traffic?



			Hospital Emergency Department staff should receive training in suicide prevention assessment and management. This includes security, administrative staff, nurses, doctors. There should also be trauma informed training, especially security staff.
			Oregon Health Authority, Alliance Transitions of Care Committee and the Alliance Lived Experience Advisory Group could partner on this initiative by doing outreach to hospitals, working with them on existing policies, providing input, and sharing why this should be implemented.

- Catalog a list of data sources.
- Learning collaborative for people working in suicide prevention who are working in data, best practice, gap identification.
