From the news announcement, “a multi-media project sharing the stories of suicide attempt survivors. Each year roughly 2,000 people attempt suicide in Lane County. The Why We Build project shares survivors’ stories in their own words - lives of joy, lives of hardship; lives that are all worth living.”</p> <p>Galli shared about an amazing development in Clackamas County where they are holding their first QPR training for a gun club at Eagle Creek Gun Club. 2:45	<p>Equity Update Galli Murray</p>	<p>Draft Equity Statement: To achieve our vision, we <del>must</del> acknowledge the impact of white supremacy, institutionalized racism, and all forms of oppression. The Alliance endeavors to make Oregon a place where suicide reduction and prevention is achieved for people of all ages, races, ethnicities, abilities, gender <del>identities</del>, sexual orientations, socioeconomic status, nationalities and geographic locations.</p> <p>Leslie motioned to move this equity statement forward as is and that the nuances that come up from this statement are addressed in how we align our work moving forward.</p> <p>Don seconded Leslie’s motion.</p>

Discuss this during March.</p> <p>ASK for this committee from YET.</p> <p>Schools Committee – identified equity and youth engagement as an issue with their improvement plan. Can we expect guidance from Equity team and YET on how to solve these problems so that committees aren’t working on?</p> <p>Jenn to compile ideas of addressing youth engagement and send them to chairs to see how they would like to move forward.</p> <p>Schools – what kind of guidance do we need from youth?</p> <p>Workforce – healthcare legislation, youth input on how this lands for them.</p> <p>June – long session legislative priorities are due.</p> <p>Gordon’s idea for a think tank - How about focus group on School Crisis Team - do you have one in your school, is it working.
