9:35	Big View, Review, Preview of Committee Work	-Review committee purpose -Last meeting review -Present meeting actions - Tracker check-in -UO Project Check-In	We are a community of researchers that want to stay updated on the landscape of data in the Suicide Prevention world in Oregon with a role to provide input to OHA. Goal is to transition broadly as a committee to provide input on dashboards and data measures. John is out on vacation so we are tabling the UO Project Check-In. Zero Suicide and Garrett Lee-Smith Updates: OHA has a statewide Zero Suicide implementation grant to implement this framework in health systems. There are a lot of elements to this process including a Zero Suicide Academy, community of practice for those implementing this framework, and more. PSU assesses organizations through this process and provides feedback.



		Garrett Lee-Smith is for youth suicide prevention activities and covers trainings, working with school-based health centers and ODHS to hold suicide prevention trainings. PSU has one of these grants and will be presenting at this year's Oregon Suicide Prevention Conference (OSPC) taking place in October in Ashland.
		Elissa would like to hear more about healthcare provider engagement and how this is going. What are lessons learned in trying to engage them? Karen: for any effort to engage providers, you need support from leadership. The Zero Suicide Framework includes elements on how to engage providers like connecting with leadership, tracking trainings, funding, reviewing systems, and more. If you are interested in Zero Suicide there will be at least one consultant from the Zero Suicide Academy at this year's OSPC.

Potential tasks for Data & Eval Committee (brainstorm ideas)

- Catalog a list of data sources.
- Learning collaborative for people working in suicide prevention who are working in data, best practice, gap identification.
- Score Card—assess how we are doing to get aligned with national standards of suicide prevention data. Focus on how to improve this.
- o Improving the data literacy and competency of people across the state.
- o Build the capacity of the field to be more data driven.
- Data coordination—what metrics are most important to collect on a local level and how do we feed these into the larger scheme of things. Review the data dashboard on a routine basis.
- Who holds the task of providing data sources and the data dashboard for us to review.
- o Think tank brain trust for individual research presentations.
- What are the universe of data metrics? How does this connect protective and risk factors.
- We review the data, understand the strengths and gaps, a forum for learning and supporting each other who are doing in research.
