	Community Membership Partnership Possibility	Sarah Greenwood met with the Committee today to share about her story, her brother, and concerns around gaps in current ERPO laws.
		Concern with ERPO:
		Nothing in current ERPO laws state what the responsibility of law enforcement officers who file ERPO petitions.
		Training for ERPO – it's not required for law enforcement to take a training on ERPO laws.
		The court should have the authority and discretion to hold the hearing until the contested officer can attend.
		Sarah's ask – long-term goal for the Alliance to partner and work with Sarah on legislative fixes.
		Kelie – in the ERPO process, officers have to give an affidavit for why they feel the person is at risk to themselves or others. She asks what Sarah thinks an important step would be when the officer doesn't show in



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	person. Sarah thinks that the lowest bar should be that the officer be
	called to see why they aren't present and if they will be in attendance.
	Sarah doesn't want private citizens to have to attend ERPO hearings due
	to safety reasons but she believes that law enforcement officers should
	have to attend. What she thinks would be most helpful is that the court
	could push back the hearing / reschedule it for a different day that meets
	the 21-day current time requirement.

	place.
